It was love at the first "hello"

when Damanjeet stepped into the Saddletowne YMCA to drop off her two young children for the preschool program nearly a decade

She began volunteering with the preschool program, and after a few vears she was hired as a Preschool Instructor. Today, as Preschool Supervisor, Damanjeet is always there to welcome children and their parents to the Saddletowne YMCA.

Damanjeet strives to make all families and children coming through the doors feel as welcome as she did when she first started her YMCA journey.

"We're so pleased that our preschool program registration has once again returned to prepandemic levels," she says. She explains this is in large part due to the relationships YMCA caregivers have with the whole family.

"The Y is different from other places in that respect – we know the parents and siblings of each child. Our team members are caring and they welcome the entire family. It is a very close community."

The YMCA bases our programs on the needs of each of our communities. These quality programs help individuals connect in our communities so everyone can grow, thrive, lead and belong – the vision of YMCA Calgary.

Art ignites new passions and confidence, contributing to community wellness



Terese Mullin Arts Program Director, Shane Homes YMCA at Rocky Ridge

As a young person, Terese Mullin used art as her voice. She learned art can be a meaningful contributor to individual and collective wellbeing and connection. It was this belief that led her to share art with the greater community.

As Arts Program Director, Terese brings arts programming to the community, including programs and camps in drama, dance, visual arts, and choir. Participants learn about belonging and about themselves through expression and exposure to different art forms and styles.

"These programs really open up arts exploration for kids who might not otherwise get this kind of exposure," she says.

Throughout the spring and fall of 2022, Terese also inspired seniors at Silvera to find their artistic voices. She created a 12-week program to help Silvera residents focus on the process of making art, emphasizing the joy of creating. Both sessions ended in an art exhibit.

"We hosted an exhibit of residents' works last spring. When residents saw their art in a new light, professionally and respectfully displayed in a public space, they

had a perceptible sense of pride and excitement."

The abundant, sincere encouragement residents provided to each other demonstrated the meaningful connections they formed. "This program has been a significant highlight and brought so much meaning to my work here at the YMCA."

"Thank you so much for the art showing. I have schizophrenia and find that I am isolated. Art has really helped me express myself...it has helped me feel unique and worthwhile."

Indigenous youth move toward the future, with strong foundations of their culture

As one of only three Indigenous kids in his high school class of 600 students, Teigan Smith says he felt disconnected and alone during his high school years. When he started working with Indigenous youth at a YMCA camp, he was learning alongside them.

"The more I found out about my culture, the more I felt connected," he explains.

Now, seven years later, Teigan is an Indigenous Youth Coordinator, managing the Indigenous youth program that takes place at Henry Wisewood and Joane Cardinal-Schubert High Schools.

Students receive land based, Indigenous teachings and build a community of support with people from the same cultural background.

"Sometimes these kids don't have the cultural knowledge or experience in their home lives," Teigan says. "Much of this knowledge was lost at residential schools. Our program provides Indigenous youth with a sense of self while building a connection to their culture."

At Joane Cardinal-Schubert school, the youth in the YMCA program created their own Indigenous space and smudge room.

"The students connect what they are learning with practices in their own homes," he says. "They are part of the reconciliation process, doing reconciliation work at their own schools."

"Brave Dogs helped me start my path to reconnecting with my culture and provided me with a safe community within the school where I could have fun and be myself during and outside of Brave Dogs."

Mentorship and tutoring program results in confidence and personal development for students

Christina helps run the

in math and science. Each of the students demonstrate both academic and financial need, and many are at risk of not completing high school.

"Our tutoring program really innovated through the past few years, developing hybrid classes that help students who have transportation challenges or work conflicts," she explains. "We are able to help new Canadians who are upgrading, or students who need the extra support and can't make it to a physical location."

The program currently has 129 volunteers and 280 students across Calgary, including online learners. Demand for tutoring services is extremely high, with more than 500 applicants in line for support next semester.

Her team has seen significant learning challenges that have developed through the pandemic.

"We prioritize students who have no other options for tutoring access," she says.

This demand has resulted in a significant need for financial support from donors and people power from volunteers.

"Many of our volunteers are professionals, retired people, premed, engineering and advanced placement students," she says.
"Volunteers really help develop these students' confidence, motivating and mentoring kids who are struggling."

"The support I received through the YMCA Tutoring Table program has had a positive impact on my education and future career opportunities. I would love for this program to keep helping people as much as it helped me."
